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DAY 1

Upon arrival, our team will pick you up from the Luxor airport and take you to your Dahabeya, a traditional two-masted sailboat. There, the crew will show you to your cabin and lunch or dinner will be served.





DAY 2

Enjoy breakfast before heading to the Valley of the Kings in the early morning. The tour starts with one of Egypt's greatest monuments : the Temple of Hatchepsut, followed by the Coliseum of Memnon. After lunch, the boat begins its voyage towards Esna, during which you can enjoy an open air dinner.

DAY 3

At dawn, the Dahabeya continues its course, towards Edfu, passing by Esna's lock. The magnificent Temple of Edfu will emerge before you, its entrance guarded by two granite statues of Horus, the falcon-headed god. All meals are offered on board.

DAY 4

After breakfast, we visit the rock-cut Temple of Hormoheb, carved in Ancient Egypt's famed quarry on Gebel Silsila. Lunch is served on deck as we sail towards Kom Ombo. Its temple is divided into two perfectly symmetrical halves: two entrances, two corridors and two sanctuaries. One is dedicated to Haroeris, or Horus the great, and the other to Sobek, the crocodile god. Dinner on board.





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DAY 5

Admire Aswan's surroundings whilst having breakfast. The city's tour begins with the High Dam and includes the visit of the famous Philae Temple, dedicated to the goddess Isis. After lunch on board, we sail towards Nubian villages where you will be welcomed by locals. Dinner on board.

DAY 6

You are free to choose between two options :

- An excursion by road to the extraordinary Temple of Abu Simbel, dedicated to Ramses II and his wife Nefertari. A meal will be provided during the visit.
- Free time that you can dedicate to exploring Aswan and its markets on foot. Meals will be served on board.

Sailing day, back to Luxor. We arrive mid afternoon and start visiting the east side of the Nile : take in the splendid hypostyle of the temple of Karnak, dedicated to Amun-Ra and his wife, the goddess Mut. To end the day on a high note, we move on to the Temple of Luxor right before sunset. Meals served on board.





DAY 8

Already time to say goodbye, and to head back to the airport. Before leaving us enjoy the warm and beautiful sunrise on the magical river Nile one last time.

Nota Bene

Alcohol

Although the consumption of alcohol is legal in Egypt, your Dahabeya, like most of these sailboats, may not have the required license to serve alcohol on board. The airport duty free is, however, at your disposal. You can purchase up to 4 bottles upon arrival at the airport. Alcoholic beverages are available at all the hotels.

Water

We recommend you bring your own reusable water bottle and fill it with mineral water. It is a more environmentally friendly option than buying plastic bottles.

Recommended attire

The hijab is not mandatory. It is, however, recommended that you respect Egyptian dress code when visiting the various cities and archeological sites (long trousers or skirts, tops covering your shoulders).

Although the days may be warm, nights are quite chilly. Here is what we suggest: clothes made of breathable fabric (cotton or linen), hats, sunglasses and scarves during the day and warmer options for nighttime.

Currency

The Egyptian pound (L.E. or EGP) is the local currency. Payment may be made to some vendors by US dollars or euro.

Tips & Bargaining

Egypt is a tipping culture. “Baksheesh” is the Egyptian term for tips. Feel free to bargain in the souk/market. Do not hesitate to consult your guide for help.
